Hancock expands long-term support for cancer patients in the Pilbara with multi-million dollar investment

Solaris Cancer Care will be able to expand access to its essential and personalised support to cancer patients and their families across the Pilbara, thanks to a new multi-million-dollar partnership with **Hancock Iron Ore** and **Hancock Prospecting**.

Hancock have been a long-standing backer of Solaris thanks to the generosity and support of its chairman, Mrs Gina Rinehart AO.

Under the continuing and expanded partnership, Hancock Iron Ore will provide significant multi-million-dollar contributions over multiple years, with Hancock Prospecting also contributing a multi-million-dollar donation, ensuring Solaris can continue to deliver and extend its vital support services across the Pilbara where the need is greater than ever.

Solaris provides much needed essential and personalised support to cancer patients and their families to assist with the emotional and physical effects of cancer diagnosis, treatment, recovery and ongoing care.

The announcement was made in Port Hedland with Hancock executives met with some of the brave cancer survivors and patients currently being helped by Solaris and heard firsthand their inspiring and courageous stories.

As a result of this generosity, Solaris will be able to significantly expand its regional hub, employing an additional Cancer Support Coordinator and social worker, to provide tailored guidance and hands-on support for Pilbara-based patients, their carers and families, with an in-depth understanding of the unique challenges they face when accessing healthcare.

Key services offered will include:

- · Individual counselling and crisis support.
- Help navigating the healthcare system in both the Pilbara and Perth.
- Coordination of supportive care services (Carers course, therapies, workshops).
- Connections to local networks and community groups, including ReachUs, Hedland Well Women's Centre, WA Country Health Service and the McGrath Foundation.
- Bereavement support and information from diagnosis through to post-treatment care.

This support of Solaris builds on Hancock's long history of standing with patients and driving progress in cancer care. In the early 1990s, Mrs Rinehart established Australia's first dedicated breast cancer foundation and initiated the nation's first national Breast Cancer Day. In the early years, Mrs Rinehart organised a huge petition that has helped lower the age for breast cancer checks, quietly funded patient care packages and research, and launched the world's first fleet of pink mining trucks, now echoed across its trains, uniforms, and more.



Through staff giving programs and business contributions, Hancock continues to foster a culture of compassion, assistance and hope.

Solaris Cancer Care, Pilbara client Tabarena Waddaman said "When I got diagnosed, I was worried and scared, I was worried for myself and my daughter. Solaris cared for me and made me feel ok with getting my treatment. They made sure my daughter was looked after. They helped me get to my accommodation, took me to the shops. Made it possible for me to continue my treatment. Solaris gave me the confidence to go ahead with my surgery. If they were not supporting me I would not have kept going with my cancer treatment. I thought I had nobody here, but I had Solaris. When I have team members of Solaris with me I feel safe"

Mrs Gina Rinehart AO, Chairman, Hancock Iron Ore said the company was proud to support such a vital service for people in regional Australia living with cancer.

"Cancer isn't only about the medical battle. It's also the emotional and practical toll that diagnosis brings for patients especially and their families and others close to them which is why the work Solaris does is so essential."

"I am especially proud of how our team embraces this cause – not only showing care and compassion to colleagues and fellow Australians facing cancer but also raising funds and giving their time to support them. Our staff live this commitment every day, and it is a culture of genuine support that I hope will inspire many other companies and organisations around Australia to follow."

"I have worked alongside Mrs Rinehart since the early 1990s, and been to many of the functions she has organised towards helping those facing breast cancer and in more recent years been by her side when she launched the first pink trucks, the first pink trains, and the first pink WHIMS (Wet High-Intensity Magnetic Separation) plant, all first in the world, but I was especially touched by her personal words to breast cancer patients and her speeches on their behalf.

"As I look back on my long career with Mrs Rinehart, one of the things of which I'm the most proud, is how Mrs Rinehart's genuine care of those facing cancer has been adopted by our staff, so that when a staff member is given that diagnosis, she or he is surrounded by staff who genuinely care and offer to help.
